

### Personality Test Result:

The Basic Personality Inventory (BPI) is designed to appraise a number of broad facets of personality and psychopathology both within the normal population and within the populations of persons experiencing psychological distress. The said test contains twelve scales that assess the following: hypochondriasis, depression, denial, interpersonal problems, alienation, persecutory ideas, anxiety, thinking disorder, impulse expression, social introversion, self-depreciation, and deviation.

### BPI Interpretation

Scale	T-Score	Description
Hypochondriasis	85	He may experience persistent anxiety and fear regarding his health, often dwelling on minor symptoms or interpreting normal bodily sensations as signs of serious illness. He seems to have a tendency to focus on bodily sensations and perceive them as abnormal or threatening.
Depression	45	He tends to have a usual feeling of confidence, cheerfulness, and persistence, even when experiencing disappointment. He has an optimistic attitude about the future.
Denial	75	He may tend to avoid confronting or acknowledging difficult emotions, painful experiences, or personal flaws. He may downplay the seriousness of his problems or the impact of negative events on his life. He may have difficulty accepting responsibility for his own actions and its consequences.
Interpersonal Problems	40	He seems to experience less than average irritation from noise, changes in routine, disappointment, and mistakes of others; respects authority and prefers clearly defined rules and regulations; cooperates fully with leadership and readily accepts criticism from others.
Alienation	38	He seems to trust others and does not feel threatened. He tends to accept responsibility for the events in life and does not attribute maliciousness to others.
Persecutory Ideas	50	He seems to generally do not exhibit significant levels of paranoia, delusions of persecution, or unfounded beliefs that others are out to harm him.
Anxiety	40	He tends to remain calm and unruffled even when confronted by unexpected occurrences. May take things as they come without fear or




		apprehension. He seems to maintain self control even in a crisis situation.
Thinking Disorder	48	He seems to have no difficulty distinguishing daydreams from reality. He tends to be able to concentrate normally and to maintain sensible conversations
Impulse expression	48	He is likely to consider the consequences of his actions before acting and to exercise self-control. He is not likely to engage in risky or reckless behavior.
Social Introversion	50	He seems to have a moderate tendency towards introverted behaviors. This means that he may prefer solitary activities, have a smaller social circle, and may feel more comfortable in smaller group settings.
Self-Depreciation	52	He seems to manifest a high degree of self-assurance in dealings with others. He tends not to be afraid to meet strangers; speaks with confidence about a variety of topics; believes in own ability to accomplish things.
Deviation	45	He is not prone to unusual or eccentric behavior. He is likely to conform to social norms and expectations.
