22	A.	Ad Interim and Additional Appointments of Personnel.
23		The Board went through the long list of proposed
24		appointees.
25		On appointments made under Board Resolution No. 6,
26		s. 1974, the Board suggested that the eligibilities of

some administrative personnel should be looked into ...

It was observed that the eligibilities of some of the appointees to non-academic positions were indicated while others were not, particularly those under the Physical Plant Office. The matter has to be looked into by the administration. It was suggested that the Personnel Division of the College review more carefully the eligibilities of the applicants, taking into consideration the Civil Service requirements.

Dean Perez remarked that at times, those without civil service eligibilities are more efficient and effective than those with civil service eligibilities.

Once an office has hired a civil service eligible, it is difficult to remove him from office.

In this connection, President Bernardo explained that most of the proposed appointments presented Board for reconsideration were under the Physical Plant Division. For instance, there are good mechanics or electricians who do not have eligibilities. "At any rate", said the President, "all of those without civil service eligibilities are being recommended for appointment on temporary basis. No one will be given a permanent appointment unless he has proven himself, and has finally obtained the appropriate civil service eligibility.

On motion duly seconded, the Board passed:

BOARD RESOLUTION NO. 36, s. 1976

Approving the additional and ad interim appointments ments of personnel, and noting the other appointments made by the College President as authorized under Board Resolution No. 6, series 1974, with the advice that the administration should see to it that in the making of appointments the Civil Service requirements should be strictly observed specially on matters of eligibilities of some staff, including those of the Physical Plant Office. (Appendix A)

B. Awarding of Contract for the Construction of the Crop Research Center.

President Bernardo made mention of the letter of Dr. Agustin N. Ramos, Jr., Chairman, Bids and Awards Committee II, recommending approval of the award of contract to ARTECH Construction Co., Inc. (ACCI) in the amount of P1,944,727.00. The Committee Chairman justified his recommendation by stating that besides giving a reasonable bid, the ACCI did a creditable job for the EDPITAF in the construction of the Regional Manpower Training Center in Bacolod City. Also, in ACCI's bid for construction of the proposed PCARR Headquarters at the Economic Garden in Los Baños, Laguna, the cost/sq.m. of floor area was only about P910/sq.m. against the PCARR bid price of about P950/sq.m.

In view of the foregoing justifications, the

26	President Bernardo also explained the Supplement-

2		and Veterinary Medicine and the High School are having
3		problems with their animal projects because of

5		The Board, interposing no objection to the
6		proposed supplemental budget, passed:

11		E. Proposed Policies on Relocation Expenses.
12		After a lengthy and thorough discussion on the
13		matter, the President decided to withdraw the proposal
14		because the Board pointed out that it was vulnerable to
15		criticism, it was discriminatory, and it was subject to
16		auditing inquiry. Besides, relocation expenses are
17		covered by policies on transferring personnel as con-
18		tained in government rules and regulations (Revised
19		Adm. Code, Sec. 304-306 and R.A. 738, Sec. 287b).
20	IV.	Academic Matters:
21		A. Proposed Creation of the Department of Horticulture.
22		President Bernardo reiterated the proposal to
23		create the Department of Horticulture and to offer a
24		major in Horticulture. Acting Chairman Suarez inquired
25		whether there was a need for such department. In
26		answer, President Bernardo cited Rationale No. 1 in the

1.	proposal. He also cited UPLB and other agricultural
2	colleges and universities abroad where Horticulture i
3	a department by itself; thus, indicating the importan
4	to the field by the institutions. Board Member Perez
5	with the support of Board Member Ayaso, proposed that

7	man Suarez observed that that was a necessary measure in
8	the interest especially of the graduating students to avoid
9	overlapping or duplication of courses and enable students
10	to graduate on time.

On the basis of the bidding held on July 9, 1976 at the Casino Español in Cebu City for the construction of the proposed Research Crop Center Building, we would like to recommend approval of the award of contract to Artech Construction Company, Incorporated (ACCI) in the amount of P1,944,727.00 subject to the terms and conditions stipulated in the bid documents which were issued to all participating bidders prior to the date of said bidding.

Please note that the proposed contract price being recommended herein is lower by \$\text{P904,988.00}\$ or 31% than the government estimates of \$\text{P2,849,715.00.}

In making this recommendation, the Committee took cognizance of the justifications given by Mr. Eduardo Manuel, President of ACCI, to the Committee on Bids and Awards in a meeting which was convened immediately after said bidding. The unit prices for various construction materials which he submitted appear to be reasonable and comparable to prevailing market prices. A thorough review of his breakdown of bid prices shows that all items of work called for in the proposed building are adequately considered and included in his estimates.

In addition, the Committee also considered the following:

1) His project with the Educational Development Projects Implementing Task Force (EDPITAF) for the construction

2) For comparison purposes, the bid of ACCI was compared to the results of the bidding which was held July 6, 1976 for the construction of the proposed PCARR Headquarter at the Economic Garden in Los Baños, Laguna. On the basis of a cost per square meter of floor area, the bid of Artech Construction Company, Incorporated amounts to about P910.00 per sq. meter as against the PCARR bid price of about P950.00 per sq. meter.

In view of the foregoing, the Committee decided to accept the reasonableness of his bid and to recommend the award of contract to him.

We trust that you find the above justifications for the proposed contract award to Artech Construction Company, Incorporated acceptable.

PROPOSED CREATION OF THE DEPARTMENT OF HORTICULTURE AND OFFERING OF A MAJOR COURSE IN HORTICULTURE

RATIONALE

At present, courses in horticulture (plantation crops, fruits, vegetables, ornamentals and landscaping) are offered in the Department of Agronomy and Soils of ViSCA. While there is nothing objectionable to this set—up, it is felt that horticulture should be separated from agronomy as a department because of the following reasons:

- 1. Horticulture is a large and important area of concern in agriculture, particularly in the Visayas, and must therefore be given greater attention. About 28 per cent of the total hectarage of coconut, abaca, fruits and nuts in the country is in the Visayas. On the other hand, the Visayas region produces only about 13 per cent of the vegetables in the country, which is infufficient to supply the requirements of about 10 million people in the region, or one-forth of the country's population.
- 2. The separation of horticulture from agronomy will hasten the development of manpower training programs on coconut, abaca, fruits and vegetables as well as research and extension activities on these horticultural crops. There shall also be sharper focus of department efforts and resources on the development of horticulture as a specific field of specialization.
- 3. In U.P. Los Banos and in many agricultural colleges and universities abroad, horticulture is a department by itself, which is indicative of the importance given to the field by the institution.

4. With the creation of a department of horticulture, it will be possible to eliminate actual and potential conflicts between the Department of Agronomy, on the one hand, and the National Root Crop Research Center and the Regional Coconut Research Center, on the other hand. This problem can be solved by making the Director of the NRCRC concurrently chairman of the Department of Agronomy and Soils, and the Director of the RCRC, concurrently chairman of the Department of the Department of Horticulture, or vice versa for each case.

With the creation of the Department of Horticulture, it is also proposed that Horticulture be offered by ViSCA as a major course in the BSA curriculum.

OBJECTIVES

Offering Horticulture as a major course in the BSA curriculum has the following objectives:

- 1. To turn out agricultural professionals who shall help develop plantation crops, fruits, and vegetable industries of the Visayas region.
- 2. To help meet the manpower requirement of government and private agencies to carry on their programs involving horticultural crops production.

3. To provide opportunities for BSA students to choose Horticulture as a major course, aside from the other seven major areas already offered, thus making the curriculum more responsive to the needs of the region.

A PROPOSAL TO PROVIDE A NON-THESIS PROGRAM FOR THE THIRD AND FOURTH YEAR STUDENTS IN THE "OLD" BSA CURRICULUM IN VISCA

Introduction

About two years ago the curricular offerings at ViSCA which were carried over from VAC, were revised to be more responsive to the needs of the times. One of the curricula revised was the BSA curriculum.

As a consequence of the revision, the "old" BSA curriculum is scheduled to be phased out by the end of the school year 1973-79. However, judging from the past and current performance of thesis students in this curriculum, the phasing out may extend far beyond 1978-1979. This probable delay is reflected in Table 1 below.

At present there are still 90 seniors and 72 juniors in this curriculum or a total of 162 students. Of this number only 20 are eurolled in Thesis 1b (Manuscript Preparation) and 72 are in Thesis 1a (Thesis Outline Preparation) during the first semester of 1976-77. Sixty more students are expected to register in Thesis 1a and 1b in the coming semesters.

Rationale

Based on the performance of those who finished their theses, it took an average of four months to have their outlines processed and approved and six months for their manuscripts to undergo the same process, or a total of 10 months for writing and polishing alone. Actual field experimentation and data processing took an average of 8 months. Therefore, the thesis period was $1\frac{1}{2}$ years. Consequently, there will be many juniors and seniors in the "old" BSA curriculum who will not be able to graduate on time.

The current intensified food production campaign of the government needs a large number of BSA graduates who are not necessarily trained to do research work. General Order No. 47 also requires large private companies to produce

the food requirements of their workers. This program needs "production-oriented" agriculture graduates. There is, therefore, a dire need for agricultural schools to turn out more graduates who can help increase food production. In Central and Eastern Visayas alone there are some 350 unfilled positions in the BPI and BAEx requiring BSA graduates while the combined output of BSA graduates by ViSCA and UEP is only about 30 a year, based on 1974 and 1975 records. Adding the demand by private firms, one can see the critical shortage of BSA graduates now.

In the old BSA curriculum there are only two major fields (Agronomy and Animal Husbandry) with a total of 162 thesis students. At present there are 10 senior staff members who advise these students with the assistance of 15 junior staff members. The simultaneous implementation of the two BSA (old and new) curricula also imposes additional load on the staff members in terms of new course offerings and more thesis students.

Considering the current large number of thesis students in the "old" and "new" BSA curricula and the limited facilities, advisement is indeed critical.

Therefore, there is an urgent need to offer a non-thesis program for the "old" BSA curriculum students now to help solve the aforementioned problem starting the second semester of 1976-77.

Implementation of the Non-Thesis Program

- 1. Selection of students who shall be in the thesis or non-thesis program shall be done by the Department concerned based on students interest and capability and on available staff and facilities.
- 2. Course requirements of the non-thesis program. Those in the non-thesis program shall be required 6 units of additional course work related to the student's field of interest, and another 6 units of Directed Farm Practice. The 6 units in Directed Farm Practice will be equivalent to one summer course (6 weeks at 8 hours a day from Monday to Friday) in agricultural projects at ViSCA or in other worthwhile government and private farm projects or establishments outside of ViSCA. The main components of this program are:

 (1) project study preparation; (2) financing farm projects; (3) on-the-job training in day-to-day activities of the projects; and (4) record keeping.
- 3. Period of implementing the non-thesis program. This proposed program is recommended for implementation starting this second semester, 1976-1977.

The duties, functions and responsibilities of Board Members are clearly defined in the attached ViSCASELF Implementation Guide.

Please be guided accordingly.

VISAYAS STATE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE STUDENTS' EMERGENCY LOAN FUND (VISCASELF)

Rationale

One of ViSCA's concerns as a regional agricultural college is to serve the students who are mostly sons and daughters of the small Visayan Farmers. These students primarily depend upon their poor parents for their financial support, which may not arrive regularly every month. This irregularity could bring about problems to the students which may result further in poor performance in their class activities.

U. P. at Los Baños (UPLB) has a Students' Emergency Loan Fund which, according to information, is of great help to students. Its operation started with the extension of financial aid in the form of petty cash loan equal to a student's property deposit of P10.00. The funding was augmented by the interest on loans and fines. At present the CASELF is already extending loans for tuition fees and is also granting scholarship to selected students.

In UPLB and CMU the students are required to pay the full amount of their schools fees during registration, while in ViSCA, enrollment procedure allow students to enroll by paying about one-half of their school fees upon enrollment. Considering the amount that the ViSCA students are to pay in order to be enrolled, the Committee believes that it is not necessary to create the ViSCASELF to cater to loans of different nature other than petty cash.

Objective

To extend petty cash loans to bona fide students for their emergency needs.

Possible Sources of Funds

The most important item needed for the creation of the ViSCASELF is capital. Below is a list of the possible courses of loanable funds for its operation.

- Students' property deposits;
 Fines from various violations;
 Donations or deposits of interested parties;
 Proceeds from unclaimed found items; and
 Interest from loans.

Governing Body

1. Board of Management - (General functions, Officers and Duties)

The general supervision of the ViSCASELF should be vested upon a board of five (5) members with the Accountant and the Director of OSA as ex-officio members and three others to be appointed by the College President with a term of two years. The members should elect the officers from among themselves which will include the following:

a. Chairman

The Chairman of the Board of Management should preside over all meetings of the Board. He will also perform such other duties as the Board of Management may prescribe.

b. Vice Chairman

The Vice Chairman shall perform the duties of the chairman in the absence or disability of the latter.

c. Secretary

The duties of the Secretary are the following:

- 1) Keep a complete record of all meetings of the Board of Management;
- 2) Give notices of all meetings called; and
- 3) Turn over to his successor all properties in his possession belonging to the ViSCASELF.

2. Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be appointed by the Board of Management from among the staff members of the Cash Division who is not a member of the Board.

The duties of the Treasurer are the following:

- a. Take custody of all money, securities, and papers of the Viscaself;
- b. Keep a complete record of all transactions for the establishment of proof of his position at any given time and date;
- c. Keep a complete list of all the student borrowers and maintain a correct record of accounts of the same students:

d. Prepare and submit quarterly report to the office of the Director of Administrative and Business Affairs through the Chairman of the Board of Management; and

Turn over all money, securities, papers, books and other properties belonging to the ViSCASELF that he may have in his possession upon the election or appointment of his successor.

3. Auditor

The function of the Auditor is to audit the Treasurer for at least once in two (2) months and submit a report of the result to the Chairman of the Board of Management.

Loan Assessor

There shall be at least three (3) Loan Assessors appointed by the Board of Management, any one of whom may perform the following:

- Process, evaluate and recommend approval or disapproval of loan applications;
- Evaluate the loan based on the following considerations:
 - 1) Proper accomplishment of the loan application and applicant's statement;
 - 2) Loan only to students who are badly in need of cash to meet their basic needs;
 - 3) The purpose(s) for which the loan be granted;
 - 4) Indebtedness of the student; and 5) Qualifications of the guarantor.

Proposed Policies

For the ViSCASELF to attain its primary objective, the following policies should be observed:

1. Only bona fide students of ViSCA can borrow;

2. The maximum amount of loan to be granted to each borrower is P50.00;

3. Settlement of account is a pre-requisite to further borrowing;

4. A guarantor (who should be a member of the ViSCA staff) is necessary for the approval of the loan; however, members of the Governing Body of the ViSCASELF are not authorized to act as guarantor;

5. The maturity period of the loan is thirty (30) days;

6. As interest of one (1%) percent per month or a fraction thereof is to be charged on the loan (not discounted);

7. A find of PO.10 per day shall be imposed beyond the maturity date regardless of the amount of the loan;

The guarantor is responsible to the ViSCASELF for any amount beyond the property deposit of the borrower in case the latter leaves the college without paying;

- 9. Students and staff clearances should pass through the ViSCASELF;
- 10. Use of the loan for purposes other than the purpose for which it was granted is punishable by making the loan due and demandable; and
- 11. The ViSCASELF Board of Management may formulate additional policies or hire additional staff members who are deemed necessary for the successful operation of the ViSCASELF.

Implementation

Before starting the operation of the ViSCASELF, it is proposed that a seminar be conducted for the students by the ViSCASELF Board of Management to clarify its objective, management, and policies.
